COVID-19 cases continue to cause hospitalizations throughout Southern California due to the Delta variant. While the vast majority of the hospitalizations are among the unvaccinated, some people are still hesitant to get the COVID-19 vaccine. Here are five important reasons to get vaccinated today:


1. The vaccine can help prevent you from getting seriously ill, being hospitalized or dying from COVID-19.
2. The vaccines are safe and will not make you sick with COVID-19.
3. The COVID-19 vaccines are effective. As we are seeing in our own community, infection rates are dropping due to the high level of vaccination rates in our city and throughout the state.
4. The Delta COVID-19 variant circulating now is highly contagious. Even if you have had the virus, studies show the vaccine can offer a higher level of immunity to prevent serious illness.
5. Once you are fully vaccinated, you can start doing more. Many employers, restaurants and entertainment venues are now requiring proof of vaccination.

The FDA recently approved the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine, and the CDC recommends that certain people receive a booster shot of Pfizer's vaccine at least six months after getting the first two doses.

One day, out of the blue, Caesar Penney started experiencing severe abdominal pain. It did not improve after a few days, so he made an appointment with his primary care physician to get checked out. The next day, Caesar received a message that said he needed to go to an emergency room right away. When Caesar arrived at a local hospital, “I was surrounded by doctors and nurses, but no one told me what was wrong with me or what was going on,” he said. He then passed out.

When Caesar awoke, he was finally able to get some answers. He was diagnosed with a massive infection of the bowel caused by a chronic gastrointestinal disease known as diverticulitis. He was monitored for a day and a half, told

he would need to schedule a follow-up appointment with a surgeon and sent home. “I didn’t feel like I was being treated right,” Caesar says. He began researching other hospitals where he could have his procedure. He had heard only good things about Huntington Hospital, and so made an appointment here with surgeon Wes Powell, MD.

Right from the start, Caesar knew he was in good hands. “Dr. Powell made me feel like I was at the right place for the health care that I needed,” he says. “It was a completely different experience.” By the time he had connected with Dr. Powell, Caesar’s pain had become debilitating.

The surgery, which involved removing infected parts of Caesar’s

colon, was a success. Caesar spent a week in the hospital. Due to the pandemic, his loved ones were not allowed to visit him while he recuperated, but he never felt alone. “When your health is compromised like mine was,” he says, “you need personal care. Everyone acknowledged my fear, always asked how I was feeling, and made me feel comfortable. It’s a reflection of the type of institution Huntington Hospital is.”

Today, Caesar is doing well and recently got married. Once nearly incapacitated due to pain, he is now back to being the active young man he was — and hopes to complete a triathlon next year. “Huntington Hospital took such good care of me,” he says. “If it weren’t for the hospital, I might not have a story to tell.”

Healing hearts.

When Josie Hanafi began to experience blurry vision and a terrible headache, she was not in our area. She was rushed to the emergency room at another hospital, where it was confirmed that she had suffered a major stroke.

Upon her release from the hospital, Josie scheduled a follow-up appointment with Fernando Roth, MD, a cardiologist affiliated with Huntington Hospital. Through a diagnostic ultrasound, Dr. Roth determined the likely cause of her symptoms: Josie had a patent foramen ovale (PFO) — a small opening between the two upper chambers of her heart.

She was referred to Azhil (Alex) Durairaj, MD, medical director of cardiology here. Dr. Durairaj performed a minimally invasive procedure on Josie in our Heather and Paul Haaga Hybrid Catheterization Suite, located in our new Heart & Vascular Center. “I was actually the first patient to ever be treated in the hybrid suite,” says Josie. “I’d never seen anything like it. It was a spectacular space full of the most state-of-the-art instrumentation.”

The first of its kind in our service region, our hybrid suite accommodates both catheterization *and* surgical procedures. Josie’s procedure went perfectly. “I’m so thankful for Dr. Durairaj,” she says. “I felt like I was his only patient. Dr. Roth was also amazing, and the nurses were so reassuring. They even played music for me before the procedure to help me stay calm.”

Josie went home the next day feeling great, and she returned to work a week later. She was quickly back to her normal activities, which include being a wife, mom and volunteering at her church. “Having a heart procedure can be scary,” says Josie, “but I knew I was in the right place.”
